Bobbitt, U.S.A.F., retired, departed this life on March 2005 at Chandler Healthcare in San Antonio. Texas, following complications from cancer. She was 93 years old. She served her country bravely for 22 years in the U.S. Air Force Nurse Corp, was an educa-tor for over 20 years, and was a beloved aunt and great aunt to many. Born in Brownsville, Texas in 1912 and a 42-year resident of San Antonio, she was predeceased by her parents, Quintina Leal de Sanchez and Martin Sanchez, and by her sisters and brother. Carmen S. Stegman, Rosa . Leach. and Antonin Sanchez, all of Brownsville. She is survived by nieces Quintina Stegman Thomas Brooklyn, NY and Barbara Perry Bara of Hemingway, SC, nephews Walter Leach of Milford, OH and Frances Stegman of San Antonio, TX; two grandnieces, Miriam Perry grandnieces, ivilia... Mimms of Nashville, TN Roberta Perry Schlicher of Salt Lake City UT; six grandnephews, Noe' Dinnerstein, Marcos Dinnerstein, and Saul Dinnerstein of New York, NY; Karl Stegman and Saul and Andre' Stegman of San Antonio, TX, and David Perry, of Richmond, VA; and several great-grand-nieces and great-grandnephews. After graduating from Villa Maria High School in Brownsville, she received an A.A.Ed. from Brownsville Junior College in 1938 and an R.N. Diploma from the Robert B. Green School of Nursing in San Antonio in 1943, after which she was assigned to its faculty and received her commission as a Second Lieutenant in the Army Air Corp. Following designa-tion as a flight nurse in 1944 from the School of Aviation Medicine at Randolph AFB, she contin-

ued her lifelong studies both in Europe and in the United States, receiving a B.S.N. from Incarnate Word College in San Antonio In 1955 and a M.Ed. from Our Lady of the Lake College in San Antonio in 1970. Antonio in San Among her assignments during WWII was service as a flight nurse for the Air Evacuation Units in the Pacific Theatre, Japan, the Continental U.S., and the European Theater, Germany. She was also stationed in England and Paris, France, as a Nurse Administrator and Director of Dispensary at Orly A.F.B. She was privileged to serve on the medical team that accompanied President and Mrs. John F. Kennedy on a diplomatic trip to Mexico, and her last assignment was as Charge Nurse of the Emergency Wilford Room at Medical Center at Lackland A.F.B. She was honorably discharged from service on January 1, 1964. Thereafter, she taught nursing at Southern Colorado State College at Pueblo and San College, .Antonio which she retired in 1981. She was a member of the Disabled American Veterans, Retired Officers the Association, the Air Force Aid Society, Alumnae Associations of University of the Incarnate Word, Our Lady of the Lake University, and Robert B. Green School of Nursing, the Red Cross, and the Veterans of Foreign Wars. She was listed in The Who's Who of World Women in Education, Directory of Distinguished Americans, and as Personality of the South. In 1947, she received Presidential Citation from President Harry S. Truman. A lifelong advocate for veterans and students, lived a long and rich life. She was as generous independent,' and intrepid as she was proud of her heritage as a multi-genera-tion Texan.
