By that time ambulance drivers were fed - Ambulances cleaned and at rear door to receive patients and transfer inland.

When I first requested Flight nursing I was advised I was too old (younger nurses needed). When I became chief nurse it was ^{deemed} necessary that we have flight training.

I had the Flight Nurse Course. It was a tremendous course. T.S. tears + sympathy - I never had the duty.

Grand View Terrace here has a number of WW II nurse occupants and 2 nurses there in charge position. Organized a WW II Nurses Club. It has been a fine, enjoyable undertaking for all.

1943-45 stationed at Queen Victoria Hospital at Netley (across from Normandy) had wide corridors, piped in O₂ and suction in intensive care units. A large glass enclosed case at main entrance has ^{halo} Florence Nightingale's shawl and lamp as she had worked there, per information given us.

Of fairly recent date - demolished, area a park and only Chapel building remain.

Elizabeth City and Edna Carlisle and I were at Stark Gen Hosp, Charleston SC in 1941 when A.C.H. activating ETO wanted us to join her unit. (88th Gen Hosp.)

A.C.H. called us in and advised us. We agreed, said 'yes' we would go. A.C.H. told her OK if she would promise to keep us together. We proceeded to England Dec. 43. on the Queen Mary.

(tonight we had taps 3x and asked the Sgt. why. We had lost 2 gunners. Seas were rough. We were listing badly, picking swamp water on our top deck).

After arrival in Scotland she split us 3 ways. I did not see them again until I had retired.

Edna married and left the service. I can't recall her married name. (Should I come to it after mailing this I will forward it to you. Her husband, too, was in ETO.) Her husband designed or had to do with University buildings in Laramie, Wyoming. A daughter was Miss. Wyoming one time.

I had 2 older sisters ill and later in nursing Homes 15 yrs. and failed to keep in touch.

Regarding Edna, she served in the battle of the Bulge.

Elizabeth - finished 20 yrs old before marrying, her married name, Booker. She was an ~~anesthetist~~, had 2 tours in Germany, I believe and others in the Far East, Korea, I think.

I visited her at Grace House and later at Jameson Care Center, New Castle, Pa. 16105-2833. I talked to her the spring of 2003. I called again late summer and was told she hadn't been there since 1998! I had visited her there a couple yrs. before.

If I get any better data I will drop you a note.
