

We have lost a truly remarkable mother, grandmother and friend to so many.

Dora L. Burich was born in Castlewood, VA on March 7, 1920. She went home to be with the Lord on Tuesday, July 10. 2007

Dora grew up in Loyall, KY, graduating Loyall High School when she was just 16. In 1987, she returned to her alma mater where she received the Alumni of the Year award. At 17, Dora enrolled in the Bethesda School of Nursing in Cincinnati, OH and received her diploma in 1940. During the early days of World War II, she enlisted in the Army Air Corps and became an air evacuation nurse, tending to wounded soldiers and living all over the world. She also served during the Korean Conflict.

During her nearly 15-year military career, Dora lived in Iceland, Paris, Hawaii, the Azores, Saudi Arabia and Japan, where in 1952 she met a dashing young B-24 fighter pilot, Joseph Burich, whom she married January 18, 1956 in Austin, TX. She was honorably discharged from the United States Air Force on August 28, 1956. They moved to San Diego in 1958. Dora gave up her distinguished military career, because more than anything else, she wanted children.

She is survived by those children: Patricia (Trish) McNeece and her husband Mike of El Centro; Pamela and Eric Frischmuth of West Chester, OH; Paula Burich and her companion, Scott Heimer of San Diego; Penelope (Penny) Burich and her companion Richard Pledger of San Diego; Myra and Dan Kurz of Rancho Santa Fe and Phillip and Diane Burich of Kyle, TX. She also leaves behind seven grandchildren who loved her dearly; Alex Kurz; Blake and Lori Burich; Ross and Greear Frischmuth and Lindsey and Patrick McNeece. She is also survived by her sister-in-law Pat Large of San Diego and numerous nieces and nephews. She was pre-deceased by her beloved husband Joe in 2004.

Dora's nursing career spanned more than 50 years. After moving to San Diego, she worked at Sharp Memorial Hospital, was the Director of Nursing at Clairemont Hospitals, worked at Centre City Hospital and retired from Mission Bay Hospital.

Besides her family, Dora loved playing blackjack and having friends over to visit. She was the consummate hostess. There was always room at the table for one more and Christmas Eve was a favorite in the Burich household. She not only opened her home but also her heart to a number of her daughters' friends who needed a place to stay and some encouraging words. She loved them as if they were her own and many of them called her mom.
